Editor's Corner

My Uncle married an English woman in 1944, while he was serving overseas in England during WWII!

Not an 'uncommon' occurrence.....there were numerous War Brides brought back to Canada, several in our own community.

As a child growing up, my siblings and I knew of this marriage. We also knew that she didn't ever come to Canada, and in the end our Uncle and she were divorced and our Uncle re-married to the only woman we ever knew as his wife, our Aunty Arlene.

For me, there was always something curious and mysterious about this unknown woman in our Uncle's life. When my Uncle was in his 80's, I had the opportunity to talk to him about his time overseas and about his marriage and he was very honest about what happened and how the fact that she refused to come to Canada had affected his life. In our conversations, he told me her name (which I had never known prior to this) and I kept it in my memory bank (as well as my computer's genealogy records!). Her surname was the same as a very famous British Rock 'n Roll person and of course I wondered if perhaps it could be another *Eric Clapton* revelation!! Probably many or most of you know that Eric Clapton's biological father was a Canadian serving in England during WWII.

After my Uncle died, and out of curiosity (there goes that curious genealogy gene again!) I tried to find a record of his marriage on ancestry.com to no avail. Last week for some unknown reason, I plunked in my Uncle's name again on the BMD search section of ancestry.com and 'jackpot!' - there it was!! This gave me her full name and the location of the marriage. Naturally, I handed over the money and ordered the Marriage Certificate.

Then, of course, my curiosity got the better of me, and I started to search for information on her. I found out that she had re-married as well. By some little quirk of fate, both she and my Uncle re-married in the same year.

So now I wait for the documentation to arrive – I am anxious to see who her parents were, and where she was born. Some of you may wonder why I am bothering to research this person I never knew and who is surely deceased by now. In my saner moments, I wonder the same thing!! I find it hard to explain my "need to know" instincts, but those of you who have the same genetic makeup will understand totally.

If there is one thing this experience has taught me, it's that we should never give up on our research! If I had given up after not finding any record of the marriage last year, I wouldn't have known the information I now know about this event in my Uncle's life.

GPS Replaces Headstones in Calgary Cemeteries:

The City of Calgary has a new strategy for the city’s soon-to-be-full cemeteries: green burials and GPS locators for finding the dead.

Four of Calgary’s five municipal cemeteries are full, and officials estimate the Queen’s Park burial lands which opened in 1940, will run out of space within 10 years. A council committee has approved a strategy that incorporates technology, including GPS units and environmentally friendly techniques to make the most use of new cemetery land.

Two new cemeteries approved for the SE and the north of the city will have sections for green burials, where there won’t be any grave markers, according to Archie Lang, the city’s Manager of Cemeteries. A family visiting the cemetery will be given a hand-held GPS unit to find loved ones.

440 Years of London’s History Online at Ancestry.ca

In case you missed it, in the Fall of 2009, Ancestry.ca announced that 18 million parish records from over 1000 London parishes went online. The records detail baptisms, marriages and burials from more than 1000 London parishes between 1538 and 1980 and reveal the names and stories of those who lived through major events in the city’s history – including the Great Plague and the Great Fire of London. The collection pre-dates Civil Registration – the British government’s system established in 1837 to keep accurate records of citizens’ lives. The only way to trace a baptism, marriage or burial before the 19th century is through parish records.

From the book “Lovell’s Gazetteer of British North America, 1873”:

Edmonton:

A fortified village in the North West Territories. It is built of red earth, enclosed by high pickets and entered by battlemented gateways. Its vicinity is rich in coal and gold, and other minerals.

Winnipeg or Fort Garry:

The seat of government of the province of Manitoba, situated at the junction of the Assiniboine and Red Rivers, 40 miles S. of Lake Winnipeg, 65 miles from Pembina, U.S., 250 miles from Fort Abercrombie, 1180 miles from Montreal, via proposed Canada Pacific railway, or 1843 miles via Chicago and St. Paul. The city contains about 25 stores, several saw mills, 4 printing offices, a telegraph office, a theatre, a Church of England cathedral, Presbyterian and Wesleyan churches, two colleges, several schools, a bank and branch bank, government house, legislative buildings, many good dwellings and a strong and regular fortification. Winnipeg is the seat of the See of the Metropolitan of the North West. Opposite the town is St. Boniface, the seat of the See of Archbishop Tache. Total value of imports for 1872: \$942,247; exports: \$85,541. Population: 3,000.

A reminder, and once again I nag you about the resources available with your Public Library card!!!

With your library membership card in hand – log on to <http://www.yrl.ab.ca>

This is the Yellowhead Regional Library website, of which Wetaskiwin (and Millet) are members! Once at their website, click on "Search", then E-Resources. You will now find listed a whopping 44 databases from which to choose, including Genealogy. On the Genealogy section, you can search HeritageQuest Online. You will be required to log in with your membership number and your password (your phone number).

HeritageQuest Online allows you to search and view the US census records from 1790 to 1930; as well there are 20,000 book titles you can search, 8000 family histories, 12000 local histories, 250 other Primary Source documents including Tax Lists, City Directories, Probate Records and more!!!

If this doesn't convince you to get a library card, I don't know what will!!! ☺

(As a matter of interest, this is where I found all the information for my niece: her ancestors were in Massachusetts in the early 1600's and they fought in the American Revolution. The original documents can be viewed and printed.)

Library and Archives Canada:

This site <http://www.collectionscanada.gc.ca> is continually evolving. Just when I think I have the difficult website conquered, they go and change it! It is, however, worth the effort you put in to figure it out as they are also adding new information regularly. Patience is a virtue (so someone once said!).

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The following was submitted by Carole Koop. This information appeared in the "Perth County Profiles", Vol. 23 No. 4, Nov. 2005, P.58

Did You Know that the 1851 census was actually taken on 12 January 1852? The enumerator asked the informant, "How old will you be at your NEXT birthday?" The 1861 census was taken on 14 January, 1861. The person was asked, "How old will you be at your NEXT birthday?" The 1871 census was taken on 2 April 1871. The question this time was "How old are you on Census Day?" The 1881 census was taken on 4 April 1881 and the question was the same. The 1891 census was taken on 6 April 1891 and again the question about age was the same. The 1901 census was taken on 31 March 1901. This time the actual birth date was requested.

Very important information to keep in mind when trying to determine your ancestors' birth years, if you are referring to the census records of either 1851, 1861, 1871, 1881, or 1891!
