

2. **Proposed 2019 Bylaw Changes and Voting Results** – Lynne Duigou

Article 4.5.2

Present:

Any person who by a vote of no less than two thirds of the Board is guilty of unethical practice of genealogy may be refused membership, or have their membership terminated by the Board. Such refusal or termination may be appealed to the Annual General Meeting with written notice of the appeal to be in the hands of the Secretary of the Society not less than ten days prior to said meeting.

Proposed change: Replace entire paragraph with:

Any person who by a vote of no less than two thirds of the Executive Committee of the Board is believed or been found to have engaged in conduct detrimental to the good reputation of the Society may be refused membership, or have their membership terminated by the Executive Committee of the Board. Such refusal or termination may be appealed to the next regular Board of Directors Meeting with written notice of the appeal to be in the hands of the Secretary of the Society not less than ten days prior to said meeting.

Rationale: To clarify what may be considered unethical practice of genealogy and also to allow for an appeal process without having to bring it before the entire membership of the Society.

Article 6.1.2

Present:

The Board shall consist of:

- The Executive Committee as defined in 6.2.
- one elected Director from the governing committee of each Branch

Proposed: Add bullet before last bullet to read:

• Any Executive committee officer may hold more than one Society position concurrently, but shall have only one vote

Rationale: To ensure that no member of the Board has an unfair advantage of having more than one vote at any meeting by being a Branch Representative and an Executive Committee officer.

EXECUTIVE REPORTS

President Jock Howard

Volunteer Hours: 229

Active since 1973, 2019 was our 47th year of providing genealogical services to our 678 members and to the community. It was the second year of my term as President of AGS. It's been a great two years; I can't believe that my term as President is nearing an end.

Throughout the 2019 year, there was a fair amount of work in several areas being done behind the scenes. Virtual executive meetings were held via BlueJeans February 8, February 20, March 18, April 20, April 23, May 10, June 26, July 25, September 4, November 2 and November 30. As well, I chaired the four Board of Directors meetings: February 23, May 25, September 21-22, and November 23. We offered a blended approach to attending the provincial Board meetings. Some people attended in person while others connected from a distance online through BlueJeans. One of my priorities during my term of office has been to increase our capacity to do seamless videoconferencing. We investigated a variety of videoconferencing providers but elected to continue with the BlueJeans platform. It offers videoconferencing, as well as phone-in capabilities for those with poor internet connections. After much trial and error, we were able to solve the last of the technical difficulties with sound and picture quality when a room full of people share one access point. This paves the way for Branches to be able to share excellent speakers and workshop sessions across the province.

February and May saw newly elected Directors at the AGS Board table. Thanks to all those who have agreed to represent their branch. Together we are stronger.

In March/April, I had the privilege of sitting on a committee with Connie Stuhl and Madeline

Fischer to review branch newsletters with the goal of determining the winners of the Ken Young Newsletter awards. What a pleasure it was to read such quality work being done throughout the province. The committee had some suggestions to improve the judging task, making it simpler and easier in years to come. The Board agreed and policy changes were made.

The highlight of the year was the biennial 2019 AGS Conference "Images Through Time" held 26-28 April 2019 at the Radisson Hotel & Conference Centre in Edmonton. I had the distinct pleasure of being Master of Ceremonies for the event. My sincere thanks to Lianne Kruger and her team for organizing an excellent conference with a wide variety of in-person and virtual sessions held throughout the weekend. The AGM was held on the Saturday with 52 in Many deserving people were attendance. recognized for their generous gift of time and talents to our organization. It was my privilege to present the awards, including the 2019 President's Award to Clark Lang, Medicine Hat Branch. Clark is diligently scanning 100 years of AGT/TELUS telephone books and making them available online – what an amazing resource!

On 6 September 2019, along with our Treasurer, Marion Rex, I had the privilege of representing the AGS at a meeting with the Alberta Historical Resources Foundation. We shared what AGS has been doing across the province as well as the metrics AHRF requested. It was also very interesting to listen to the presentations of the other heritage organizations, including their challenges and the great work they are doing. Our message was very positive, and it was wellreceived. The AGS was commended for the great work we are doing with astonishing volunteer participation and contribution. That work includes answering research requests, providing courses for blossoming genealogists, providing support to people in special interest groups on like-minded sponsoring outreach topics, events and collaborative events with other organizations. Those AHRF Board members who had attended our conference spoke to the quality of our event. In short, it was a real privilege to share our news and I pass on the accolades we received. In fact, they congratulated us for doing as much work as we do with the funding we get from them. How disheartening it was when we heard that the AHRF was disbanded after the budget was presented by the Alberta government on 24 October 2019. We have worked with AHRF from 1994 to 2019. With funding from the Government of Alberta reduced, we were barely able to finish 2019 with a positive balance.

Our retreat in September was successful in that we continued the work of updating our long-term Strategic Plan. We discussed the various strategic planning priorities that we had established at the 2018 retreat. At the 2019 retreat, we worked on Vision and Mission Statements as well as four strategic goals to guide our plans going forward 2019-2022. We agreed to the tagline, *Alberta Genealogical Society: Bringing the past to the present for the future!* Thanks to Wetaskiwin Branch for the wonderful suggestion.

At the November Board meeting, we looked at various ways of providing benefits to our members including reciprocal discounts to other provincial genealogical societies for members. We are in the process of looking at other benefits that we could also provide.

At this point, I'd like to give a special thanks to Linda Winski, our Office Coordinator, and Shirley Keller, our Bookkeeper, for the work they do to make the business of the society run smoothly. Their knowledge and expertise are valuable assets as they manage our day-to-day business. Early in the year, I chaired a small group who represented the Board when doing a performance evaluation for Linda. The year 2019 has been busy and productive, maintaining past practices under the oversight of this position and modifying and updating procedures to meet the times. The year began seeking nominations for Secretary and for 2nd Vice President for elections at the April AGM. Both were filled by acclamation. The names of Committee Chairs were also sought for terms to begin May 1. At the same time, in coordination with the 2nd Vice-President, current policies regarding committee chair positions were sent out to each individual for their input. A call for judges for the Kenneth Young Awards was sent out and Madeline Fischer (Medicine Hat Branch), Connie Stuhl (Drayton Valley Branch), and Jock Howard (Edmonton and Fort McMurray Branches) were selected. Allowing judges from branches submitting newsletters this year opened up the judging opportunity to all branches. Notices were sent to the membership in general through mass email, through Branch Presidents, the AGS website, and Relatively Speaking reminding everyone of awards available and seeking nominations. Many thanks to the judges for the Peter Staveley Award (Marilyn Hindmarch, Denise Daubert and Brenda Nugent) for their time and efforts.

The Newsletter Judging Committee recommended only one newsletter per branch be submitted and that each branch select a single article for each of the categories Best Local Content and for Best Original Article. These recommendations were accepted and implemented for 2019 newsletters. Recommendations were also made by this office to simplify and streamline the Awards process for the 2020 AGM.

The third weekend of September, I chaired the annual retreat, as Chair Susan Haga had an accident and was unable to attend. responsibility included chairing the Friday night session in which members brought an heirloom and talked about it (a most enjoyable exercise that I would highly recommend as a Branch activity), and chairing the workshop on Saturday. presenter, Shari Hanson, Saturday Community Development, Alberta Culture and Tourism, did a great job addressing where we are and the trends affecting where we want to be. She then guided us through our Vision and Mission Statements. Our goals were reviewed and updated resulting in four strategic goals accompanied by action plans for 2019-2022. The summary of the workshop by Shari Hanson and the evaluation summary consolidated by this office were accepted by the Board in September.

Forms and notices for the 2020 Nominations and Election were revised in 2019 and updated by 2nd Vice President Lynne Duigou in time to be included in the November issue of *Relatively Speaking* and posted online. Nominations for President and 1st Vice President were due January 31, 2020. I also began preliminary work on notices and forms for the 2019 awards with Office Coordinator Linda Winski and seeking and confirming Chair positions for 2020.

As Past President, I attended two virtual executive meetings and the Board of Directors meeting in February, the AGM in April, the virtual executive meetings of March 17, June 26, July 25, September 4, and November 2, and the virtual Directors Meeting in November. One of the pillars of my Presidency was to address the issue of wellness in our Society and particularly at the Provincial level. This past year, I have continued

It also makes the committee feel like all their work was worthwhile.

At the AGM, Wetaskiwin Branch volunteered to host the GenFair in April 2020. Thank you, Wetaskiwin Branch. (Unfortunately, GenFair has been postponed a year because of COVID-19.) Audit 2019

In the 2019 audit, AGS Provincial, Edmonton Branch, and Grande Prairie Branch were audited by KBH Chartered Professional Accountants. All other branches were reviewed. Thanks to Louise Chauvet, CPA, CA, and her team at KBH for a great working relationship during the audit process. AGS Provincial finished the 2019 year with a surplus of \$834.48. This is due, in large part, to a combination of the following:

*When it became evident that we didn't need to pay this year's insurance costs from casino income, we brought less casino funding into the

income stream. That will leave us more casino funding available for next year.

**We have started to buy \$7,000 GICs each month for a one-year term. That means that at any time, we will be less than 30 days from a GIC coming due for renewal should we need to access the funds. GICs give us a higher interest income than the savings account did.

Bookkeeping

This year was the fifth full year that Shirley Keller, our bookkeeper, has provided bookkeeping services for Alberta Genealogical She does all the AGS provincial Society. bookkeeping and helps to coordinate and consolidate all financial information provided by the branches so we can report to Revenue Canada. She also completes the GST and charity returns. She has developed an excellent working relationship with Linda Winski, our Office Coordinator in balancing funding raised through memberships, donations and conference registrations. Her help is invaluable in providing the data required for grant applications and working with the auditors. She has also developed many processes that have helped to improve efficiencies for AGS, including completing the charity status reports for Revenue Canada, which used to be done by the auditors at much greater expense.

Gaming

AGS members worked a casino on 11-12 April 2019 at Century Casino in Edmonton. The proceeds from that casino were \$74,290.87 and will help fund our rent and insurance for the next two years. My thanks to Laura Turnbull for chairing this important revenue stream, and to all the volunteers who make this event possible. Please see Laura Turnbull's Gaming report for more information.

Grants & Other Funding

The Alberta Genealogical Society (provincial) is very appreciative of the funding received through sponsorship from the Alberta Historical Resources Foundation (AHRF) \$33,300 (\$36,170 in 2019) and the Edmonton Heritage Council (EHC) \$17,396.25 (\$18,075.62 in 2019). The sponsorship received from AHRF is applied to

expenses incurred for our publications, training programs, professional consultations and general administration. The AGS metrics and annual report were presented to the AHRF Board of Directors on 6 September 2019. Funding received from EHC helps provide both staffing and operational support. The application process occurs in the fall each year. When the provincial government's fall budget came down 24 October the Alberta Historical Resources 2019, Foundation was dissolved. Our sincere thanks to the AHRF who has been a major contributor to Alberta Genealogical Society for 26 years, 1994-2019. We now fall under the jurisdiction of Historic Resources Management, Government of Alberta.

Thanks to the generosity of its members, businesses and other non-profit associations, AGS provincial (\$3,480.00) and its branches (\$3,613.96) received \$7,093.96 in donations. We are grateful to all those on the list of individual donors published in this annual report. Please see the Grants & Other Funding report for more information.

Research

In 2019, AGS consolidated raised a total of \$5,539.78 by answering research queries, as follows:

My sincere gratitude to Norma Wolowyk and her team for their efforts in providing genealogical research and support for those who make queries

Lease

Our two-year lease with Nearctic ended in November. We signed a new two-year lease for the period 2019-2021 at a reasonable rate.

Brooks and District Branch



2019 Membership 19 2019 Volunteer Hours 1,228

January: Bob Franz presented an exercise for the executive and branch members to participate in by answering the four questions listed below. The exercise was designed to take a look at what we have done as a society (our successes), what we are currently doing that we want to keep doing (because we are enjoying it), what we want to stop doing (because it is not working/is hindering us), and what we want to do in the future (so we can live long and prosper). We were asked to consider each of the following:

- 1. What issues (concerns, problems, or difficulties) are we presently facing?
- 2. What is the source (cause or reason) for each of the above issues?
- 3. What are alternative solutions to resolving each issue (how can we nullify the cause or solve the problem)?
- 4. Selection of a course of action and development of an action plan. (WHAT is WHO going to do? WHEN and HOW will we know we are there?)

Bob Franz agreed to tabulate the results for the March meeting.

At our general meeting, a video titled *Introduction to Genealogy* was presented with 11 people in attendance followed by a question and answer session.

February: The AGM was cancelled due to poor weather and was held in March. At our general meeting, Lisa Patton, Head Librarian at Brooks Public Library, gave a presentation on the genealogical resources available on their shelves as well as resources available on the library computers including Ancestry and Canadiana.

March: The AGM was held in March and the executive positions of: Vice-President – Eileen French, Treasurer – Karyn Norden and Secretary – Henry Najda were acclaimed and the position of President was accepted by Maurice Landry. Leona Ferguson gave a presentation on searching her Norwegian roots on a trip with her brother and sisters to Norway. It was discovered after the presentation that one of the people in attendance was a lost relative of the family.

Jamie Nesbitt of the *Brooks Bulletin* set up a database on the branch computer so we have digital access to the *Brooks Bulletin* from 2006 onwards. Bob presented the summary of the exercise on what the future direction of the branch should be and the executive will assess and proceed with an action plan.

April: Tony Rommens gave a presentation on his book *A Life Fulfilled* which is about his experiences during WWII in the Netherlands and his journey to Canada. Over 35 people attended this talk. Seven members attended the AGS Conference in Edmonton.

May: Mary Burkholder gave a detailed and interesting presentation on the use of Resource Mate to help branch members catalogue and retrieve information from our branch holdings. The general meeting was a discussion of two

videos: Genealogy Online – Gems & Junk, and The Library – Shelves Full of Family History. The Brooks and District Museum had a grand opening for the interactive display of the street names of Brooks which first appeared as a series of articles in the Brooks Bulletin.

June: There were no activities this month as members had other commitments so the annual field trip was cancelled this year.

July: Maurice Landry and Henry Najda were on hand at the Brooks and District Museum Canada Day celebrations to showcase genealogical books for children interested in discovering their ancestry.

August: No activities this month other than some administrative volunteer time.

September: The Branch's traditional September meeting has been a sharing of personal research or other events members have engaged in. Members continued to improve the library by labelling shelves and inserting magnetic tape into research books so the material can be accessed by the general public.

October: Jonathan Koch spoke on the Taylor Cemetery located on the Ketchmark Ranch near Bow City. A video on ghost towns was also shown. Bob Franz presented research on the 4 X 4 grid used for the locations of early school districts. Each school would be located 4 miles from any other school. There were over 30 schools in the County of Newell. The 2009-2018 *Index on Obituaries* has been printed.

November: Gordon Krinke gave an excellent presentation on seven people from Brooks who volunteered to fight during World War I. The information he presented was gathered from a visit to Europe to find the grave sites, if known, of these brave men. Their stories and others will now be included in a series of articles in the *Brooks Bulletin* over the next year. Bob Franz spoke to over 100 people at the Newbrook Senior's Lodge about the branch activities and benefits of membership.

December: Once again members of the Brooks and District Branch gathered with their spouses at a local eatery for their annual evening of good cheer and fellowship.

Throughout 2019, the Website committee has continued compiling and consolidating information that the committee has collected, spending many hours in the library sorting through our files and updating our website. The past year has been a busy one, and without the volunteers who work tirelessly every month, we would not be so successful. On behalf of the Edmonton Board of Directors, we thank those members.

As the Branch was not successful in filling some positions, the President took on additional duties including editor of *Clandigger*, co-ordinating *Tracing Your Family Tree* and responding to *Outreach* requests.

Edmonton Branch is interested in becoming an affiliate of the Family Research Library. The provincial body of AGS have referred the relevant agreement to their legal advisor for review and Edmonton Branch is awaiting a decision. Since the Bonnie Doon Family History Centre has closed, this would allow Edmonton Branch to provide access on the branch computers to databases and resources that normally are available only at Family History Centres.

Inventory: Inventory of Edmonton Branch holdings was done by members and a digital copy was generated. A special thank you to our Treasurer, Ken Fearnley; Research Committee members Norma Wolowyk, Claudine Nelson,

and John Hazelwood; and the AGS Office Coordinator, Linda Winski.

Open Doors: For more than twenty years, the Edmonton and District Historical Society has proudly presented the annual Historic Festival & Doors Open Edmonton. During the festival, they partner with community arts and heritage organizations. Edmonton Branch again participated and held an Open House the first week of July with free access to all. Members and visitors alike were assisted and learned of our library holdings and resources. Webinars for Beginners were offered between 10:00 a.m. and noon daily.

Alberta Name Index (ANI): A simple unified search of Alberta residents named in various sources. The Alberta Name Index (ANI), an Edmonton Branch AGS project, was launched 1 September 2019 on the Edmonton Branch website. The development of the project for online searching was completed OTHERMACHINES under the supervision of Dwayne Holmberg with assistance from Norma Wolowyk and the Board of Directors. Edmonton Branch webmaster completed all of the tasks necessary on the website to make the launch go smoothly. At launch date, there were 487,106 records in the index. More records will be added as they become available.

Vice-President Activities:

The role of the Vice-President is to provide support to the branch President as required. The Vice-President was involved in functions where there was no incumbent in the specific position. Some of the extra duties included: recruiting and arranging for speakers for the monthly general meetings; chairing the Nominations Committee and actively recruiting members for vacant positions; assisting in *Tracing Your Family Tree (TYFT)* and presenting one of the workshop sessions on 9 November 2019. Plans for the 2020 TYFT series of workshops was also begun.

Special Interest Groups (SIGs): Edmonton Branch has 11 SIGs that meet on a regular basis

to provide information and support to members doing research in specific areas.

Library: There is a Library Committee of four members: Leanne Templeton, Kate Binder, Arlene Borgstede and Heather Harper. They oversee the function of the library which is 'staffed' by Edmonton Branch volunteers. The library holdings include resources from many countries, local and family histories, maps and periodicals. There are computers available with subscriptions to Ancestry.ca, Genealogy Québec, and Find My Past. The Committee meets on a regular basis, purchases books and catalogues each purchase.

Programs: Our Vice-President coordinated programs for our monthly general meetings. There were programs in February, March, April, May, June, September, October, and November. In December, an appreciation luncheon was held for all volunteers and a certificate of recognition was given to Ellen Glinka for her 40 years of exemplary volunteer services.

Tracing Your Family Tree and Outreach: In 2019, the Branch received a few requests for speakers to present at retirement homes. Tracing Your Family Tree Course — The President, in conjunction with the Vice-President and the instructors, set up the courses for the 2019/2020 with seven workshops in the series.

Research Services: The Research Services Committee meets each Friday at the AGS/Edmonton Branch Library. Members in 2019 included Gordon Berdahl, Gail Cockwill, Natalie Edwards, John Hazelwood, Carol Martyniuk, Claudine Nelson, Pat Pettitt, Jeneane Roberts, and Norma Wolowyk. Shannon Cherkowski gave incredible support to the team during 2019 by searching her numerous genealogical indexes when requested.

187 queries (159 in 2018) were processed by Edmonton Branch during 2019. As AGS processed 250 (276 in 2018), the total number of

queries handled by the Committee was 437 during the year.

Clandigger: In the absence of an editor for our newsletter, I became guest editor and produced 5 issues: February, May, September, November (Remembrance) and a special Christmas issue.

Publicity: Each month, Sharon Dyer, our publicity chairperson, sent about 50 monthly meeting and course notices to various public libraries, seniors' centers, archives and other organizations including the Edmonton Journal and the City of Edmonton. As the Edmonton Branch Facebook Page editor, she posted 1-3 items almost every day throughout the year. The postings also included the meeting notices sent every two months for the Special Interest Groups that focus on specific areas of genealogical interest. She also started posting on the Historic Edmonton and Northern Alberta Facebook pages as well.

Correspondence: Our correspondence secretary, Bev Wardell, prepared and mailed 31 cards in 2019: 3 Sympathy Cards; 9 Get Well / Thinking of You cards; 19 Thank You cards (5 to Edmonton Executive members at the conclusion of their Executive terms, 1 to the Elections Chair; 8 cards to Speakers/ Presenters at Branch General Meetings; 3 to TYFT Speakers; 1 to member for long-term service to Branch; and 1 Appreciation/Christmas Greeting Card to Linda Winski for her support to the Edmonton Branch throughout 2019).

Website:

Our Annual Maintenance plan with 4WEB was renewed. It provides: Domain, Hosting, Databases, Monthly maintenance, and Webmaster Training. The following tasks are included in the plan: website support; up to 4 hours per month of changes/updates to current website pages and content; regularly scheduled phone consultations; updates to the software (WordPress) running our site; site backups; and training videos and manuals.

- A new webpage was designed to host our new research tool called Alberta Name Index "ANI" and we implemented the new functionality, developed by Dwayne Holmberg of OTHERMACHINES.
- User traffic to our website was improved with link-worthy site improvements since the old domain [agsedm.edmonton.ca] was released.
- Traffic to our website has increased by implementing a Contact Us webpage to capture visitor's email addresses, with their permission; have received several inquiries through our website.
- Throughout the year, five Edmonton Branch membership distribution lists were provided to the webmaster with an average of 364 members per list; issues of members missing from the lists were resolved.
- The Edmonton Branch brochure was revised to announce the new ANI website functionality, and redesigned *Tracing Your Family Tree* 2019 event posters and registration forms were developed.
- In 2019, we issued approximately 130 email campaigns (summary of branch mail out statistics following); the Clandigger Newsletter consistently tops the readership chart with an average 70.987% unique opens, while the DNA SIG, TYFT Workshops and General Meeting notices run closely behind at about 60.0%. Twelve members chose to Unsubscribe from the mailing lists.
- ANI, completed all of the tasks necessary on the website to make the launch go smoothly. At launch date there were 487,106 records in the index.

Computer

The mother board on the laptop being used with the Fujitsu Image Scanner for the Phone Book Project had to be replaced. However, instead of replacing it, we purchased a new laptop.

Our Windows XP laptop is now only used with our slide viewer, which is still being used by members. The Resource Mate program for the library was updated.

Through Marion Rex's liaison with Computers for Schools program, we requested one desktop computer, two laptops and two monitors which won't be available until 2020.

Library

Our Library is open on Wednesday afternoons for the public to ask questions, seek help and view our resources. We have three members available on Wednesday. Members are able to access our library Tuesday to Thursday. There are two computers as well as a photocopier, laserjet printer and slide viewer in the library for member's use.

Our Librarian is busy digitizing Newsletters that are available on our main library computer for viewing once digitized. This will free up shelf space needed for books. We have more shelving in storage but no space in the library to set them up.

The library added 284 books this year through donations. The largest donation was 119 area family histories from the estate of a local

genealogist. There are now 1,818 books/resources in our library inventory. We purchased memberships in the following societies; American Historical Society of Germans from Russia (Calgary Branch), Saskatchewan Genealogical Society, various branches of the Ontario Genealogical Society and the Nova Scotia Genealogical Association.

Fundraiser

We have a 50/50 draw at each of our meetings. It generated \$162.00 profit for the year. Christmas Cheer Raffle Basket generated a profit of \$1500.00. Proceeds from the fundraiser raffle were designated for a new laptop and Quicken Desktop Pro 2020 for the treasurer to use.

Grants

Two grants were applied for in 2019. The first grant application was to the Medicine Hat Realtors Charitable Foundation. Due to the large volume of requests submitted, we were not successful. The second grant, Documentary Heritage Communities Program (DHCP), was a lengthy and time-consuming application. We will not know the outcome of this grant until the spring of 2020.

Membership/Publicity

Membership increased by 9 new members: 13 of our members are from out of town, 12 from various places in Alberta and 1 from Texas. Executive reports prior to monthly meetings are sent to members. A number of articles & pictures have been sent to the Medicine Hat News and were published. Members continue to receive genealogy related articles and the MHDGS newsletter *Saamis Seeker*.

Projects

<u>Canadian Soldiers from Alberta</u>: A member of the MHDGS took part in a project to track down living family members of Canadian Soldiers from Alberta who were buried in the Canadian War Cemetery in Netherlands.

<u>Cemetery Database</u>: Local and area cemeteries are being photographed and we hope to link to the cemetery database.

<u>Obituary Database</u>: This consists of an index to obituaries published by Medicine Hat news, which has turned into a scanning project of obits, filed by year, month, and date of publication. We will also begin scanning the obituary card files that were collected from the time our branch began.

<u>Scrapbooks</u>: We finished digitizing the 38 scrapbooks (collection of genealogical interest) collected by a branch member over the last 40 years. The digitized copies will be available on our branch library.

<u>TELUS/AGT Phone books</u>: This project was and still is an extremely large undertaking and requires an enormous number of volunteer and paid employee hours. Most of the white pages and half the yellow pages have been scanned and are online. Phase 5 will continue with the scanning of the yellow pages which we hope to have completed in two years.

Yearbooks: School yearbooks are an overlooked source for information. They provide valuable information, tracking ancestors as students and teachers/support staff who attended or worked in the school. Our mandate for this project is to obtain yearbooks from Medicine Hat and District area and once this project is completed, they will be available on our branch library computer. To date, we have digitized approximately 100 yearbooks, most been lent to us from the community and a few have been donated to our library. We have Junior & Senior High Schools both public and separate, College and the Medicine Hat General Hospital School of Nursing Yearbooks. This information helps place people in historical context as well as provides details that helps turn individuals, sometimes only known by names and dates, into actual people. We will continue to solicit yearbooks to add to our collection.

Projects:

New Logo – After being contacted by the City of Wetaskiwin advising that we were no longer able to display the "Water Tower" logo on our website, Lyn Meehan created a new logo for our branch. This reflects the early designation of Wetaskiwin as "Siding 16" when the CPR rail line was built north from Calgary to Edmonton.

Archives Preservation – We were advised that the City Archives is now under the Wetaskiwin Public Library umbrella within the City network. We are hopeful that this is a positive step.

Community Outreach:

In February, Claudia and Alice gave a presentation at Seasons Retirement Facility in Wetaskiwin. The topic was "Beginner's Genealogy" – how to record your data, the importance of recording your personal and family history stories. Several residents were in attendance and were keen to record their 'stories' for their descendants.

Wetaskiwin branch gave 2 presentations at the Wetaskiwin Public Library in March of 2019. Wetaskiwin Public Library gained access to Ancestry, Library edition, thanks to the Yellowhead Regional Library. As our library hadn't previously offered Ancestry.com to its patrons, we felt that we could put on a course, outlining how to use the website. Claudia Malloch and Alice Hoyle gave the presentations, which were well received.

In March, Claudia and Alice also made a presentation at the Ma-Me-O Beach Public Library. The topic was "Beginning Your Genealogy" – we had a very receptive audience, eager to begin or continue with recording and researching their family history.

On October 12th, Patty Caputo, our Genealogy for Youth Coordinator, spearheaded a program at the Wetaskiwin Public Library called "Genealogy Escape Room – Ice Cream and Cookies with Nana Vera" – participants used clues hidden in the Program Room at the library

to figure out the family history of a fictitious character. Patty was pleased that the event attracted 12 young people between the ages of 12 and 18. Ice Cream and Cookies were served at the end of the event.

Outreach Initiative to Royal Canadian Legion, Wetaskiwin Branch – our branch member, Lee Koop has contacted the Legion President, advising that he would be willing to digitize to MP3 and MP4 format, all the VHS tapes, CD's and DVD's they have in their collection of recorded memories of the area's Veterans. He awaits word back from the Legion on his suggestion. In the interim, he has already converted to MP3 format – 20 audio tapes of Veterans' memories that are stored at the City Archives.

Monthly Meeting Presentations:

January: "Looking Forward, Reaching Back" – This presentation stressed the importance of reviewing all our past saved data: photos, files, movies, etc. to make sure that we can still access the information stored on the various 'older' forms of technology. Suggestions were given on how to convert older data storage systems to updated versions.

February: Family History Guide – February's program introduced a wonderful resource called "The Family History Guide" https://www.thefhguide.com/. Their web page says it is the world-class family history learning system used by learners in over 150 countries and approved by FamilySearch. Learn what's there for you. That's what many of the members attending this meeting were able to do.

March: "Perilous Assumptions" – Revisiting those First Finds: a RootsTech presentation by Kris Rzepczynski – this was a very good presentation. Kris urged us to look back at some of the research we did years ago – sometimes we miss clues in the research we previously did. This was a very useful reminder for all of us.

April: "How to Write Your Story in 5 Minutes or Less – an Allison Taylor presentation from

RootsTech. She suggested that you begin by choosing to write about an event that you experienced, perhaps an interaction with someone else. Start at the beginning of the experience and follow it through to the end. Make and edit several drafts, as necessary.

May – 2019 AGS Conference "Images Through Time": our branch members who attended the AGS Conference spoke on their favourite sessions and what they liked (or didn't like) about the conference.

June: "The Genealogy Cloud: Which Online Storage Program is Right for You?" – this presentation outlined the various options for cloud storage; how much they cost, what the storage capacity is for each option.

September: "Sharing your Genealogical Discoveries from the Summer" – members of the branch shared their research success stories. Some of the members also utilized the information given at our March presentation by re-examining their earlier research data.

2019 AGS Conference "*Images Through Time*" was held April 26-28, 2019 at the Radisson Hotel and Conference Center, $4520 - 76^{th}$ Avenue NW, Edmonton AB. The major speakers for this event included:

A member/non-member pricing structure was introduced. There were 258 paid participants (vs. 274 in 2017 and 251 in 2015). 74.8% of the attendees who attended were members. Registration was a combination of both online and paper registration with 55.4% (vs. 57% in 2017 and 27% in 2015) so online registration is definitely becoming more popular, though it did have some glitches. 95% of the attendees were from Alberta (245/258) so we are serving Albertans, as well as a wider community.

Door prizes, both cash and non-cash exceeded \$10,000. While the conference did not make money, the AGS executive considered the shortfall a good investment in our membership as the conference was the "highlight of the year".

and a terrific syllabus (which was sold in print copy to those who ordered one) and to Kurt Paterson for the work he did with Shirley Keller, the AGS bookkeeper, to organize registration and take care of finances. I would also like to thank all those who helped in any way: the sponsors, speakers, those who introduced speakers, those who worked in the vendor hall, those taking registration, those making table decorations, those who sold 50/50 tickets, and many more. Many hands make light work!

Gaming

Laura Turnbull Volunteer Hours: 35.5

AGS members worked a casino event on April 11 & 12, 2019 at Century Casino in Edmonton. Our proceeds from the event totaled \$74,290.87. This was \$1,584.96 lower than the previous casino worked in 2017 so the finance committee did not need to make too many adjustments to the budget.

In past years, we had to staff the casino with two shifts per day. In 2019, we were able to shorten the hours worked per person by going to three shifts per day. In total, 51 volunteers came forward to fill the 46 positions with many offering to work two shifts if required. I reported a total of 350 volunteer hours to the AGS office for this event. A **Very Special Thank You** to all who were able to help.

Our next casino event for AGS has been approved for the 2nd quarter of 2021 (Apr/May/Jun) at Century Casino, Edmonton. We will receive actual dates in November of 2020. This event is crucial for our society to raise funds for major operating costs for AGS including rent for our library facility and insurance costs for all branches.

AGS Raffle at Conference:

Although delayed because of blizzard conditions the first morning, we held a very successful 50/50 raffle as part of the AGS Conference on April 27 & 28, 2019. In total, 1,236 tickets were sold resulting in a net profit for AGS of \$603.95. Thank you to our wonderful ticket sellers for their excellent efforts.

Branch gaming events Casino:

- In 2019, Fort McMurray Branch had a casino on October 20 & 21 and will know the total of proceeds from that in February 2020.
- Grande Prairie Branch had a casino on May 9 & 10, 2019 and received a total of \$35,507.71 in proceeds from that event. Their next casino is slotted for the 2nd quarter of 2022.
- Brooks and Medicine Hat Branches will share a casino on March 29 & 30, 2020.

I acted as chair of the Relatively Speaking Editorial and Production Committees which produced four issues of the Journal in 2019. Thanks to the Editorial team: Denise Daubert, Suzanne Maynard, Janet Cooper, Marilyn Wales and Marie Vieria, Production Editor for their dedication to the Journal.

We are still searching for a *Relatively Speaking* Editor. I have been filling this role on an interim basis since May 2017. We have had four editors since that time and for various reasons, none have been the right fit for RS. We are certain there is a volunteer who would love the challenge of leading this dynamic editorial and production team.

This year the editorial team set four themes, edited the articles and then sent them to the Production Editor. Each Journal takes the team about 100 hours to produce. We want a high-quality product so are very particular about content, clarity, grammar, spelling and layout. Once the layout is complete the entire issue is edited again. Printing is currently done by Edmonton Public Schools Printing Services. Linda Winski, Office Coordinator, prepares all the labels for the envelopes and any inserts. The mailing crew, chaired by Jo Nuthack, stuffs the envelopes for the print edition. The webmasters put the issue on the website and send it out notifying members that it is ready for their reading pleasure.

Research Services

Norma Wolowyk

The Research Services Committee for both AGS and Edmonton Branch AGS began meeting each Friday at the AGS Library in 1999 and has continued to do so since that year. In 2019, members of this committee contributed 1,018 volunteer hours of valuable service to the community.

Participating during 2019 were Gordon Berdahl, Gail Cockwill, Natalie Edwards, John Hazelwood, Carol Martyniuk, Claudine Nelson, Pat Pettitt, Jeneane Roberts, and Norma Wolowyk. Shannon Cherkowski gave incredible support to the team during 2019 by searching her numerous genealogical indexes when requested. Carol Martyniuk raised \$760 for AGS Research through her Telus Volunteer Support hours. Thank you Carol for your many hours of volunteer time which raised funds for the Society.

Each Friday, committee members selected queries, did research in the AGS library and at other local institutions, and responded by e-mail from their own home or by mailing correspondence. A query database was maintained of surnames researched, submitter's name, locality of inquiry, the ID number assigned to each query and a description of where the query originated (e.g. AGS submission form, Edmonton Branch email, phone call to Library, etc.).

250 queries (276 in 2018) were processed by AGS during 2019. As Edmonton Branch AGS processed 187 (159 in 2018), the total queries handled by the Committee during the year was 437.

Clients were charged for copies of documents and postage if applicable. Also, they were encouraged to send additional monies to the Society in appreciation of the volunteer commitment given to their queries. These contributions continued to be a valuable source of funding for the Society. AGS revenue generated by Research Services is raised mainly through responding to requests for copies of homestead records from microfilms held

at the Provincial Archives of Alberta. Researchers first visit the AGS website and use the Alberta homestead index created by AGS volunteers. Then, using the Request for Copies button on the website, an email is sent to the AGS Research Committee. We responded to all these requests for copies and informed the researcher of costs involved in obtaining copies of records from the Society. Many clients choose not to obtain copies, but those that do are very pleased to receive these interesting records.

On 12 June 2019, three members of the committee (Pat Pettitt, John Hazelwood and Norma Wolowyk) volunteered at the Provincial Archives of Alberta to give assistance to members of the Alberta Family Histories Society who had travelled up from Calgary to work on their personal family history research. John Hazelwood also continued to volunteer at the Provincial Archives of Alberta on the 2nd Wednesday of each month giving tutorials on searching Ancestry.com.

The Alberta Genealogical Society is very fortunate to have such a wonderful group of dedicated researchers. Many have been on the team for 20 years. They respond to clients from their home computers, sit patiently at PAA microfilm readers copying land files (some up to over 100 pages), package up materials and deliver to post offices for mailing.

Thank you to Linda Winski, AGS Office Coordinator, for handling the mail for the Research Committee and collecting credit card payment information. Her prompt attention to informing Research Committee members that payment has arrived is very much appreciated.

HIGHLIGHTS OF 2019

Alberta Genealogy Society - Bringing the past to the present for the future!

- Active since 1973, 2019 was our 47th year of providing genealogical services to the community.
- Membership for 2019 totalled 678, compared to 678 in 2018, 692 in 2017 and 743 in 2016.
- Members reported **34,132** volunteer hours in 2019, an increase of 1600 + over 2018.
- The total number signing into the Edmonton Branch library including daytime visits and evening meetings was 2,972.
- The Research Committee responded to 437 research queries from around the world.
- Our journal, Relatively Speaking, resumed publication under a dedicated editorial team publishing four issues in February, May, September and November. AGS continues to offer Relatively Speaking in both hard and digital copy (\$10 discount to the membership fee).
- Youth articles continue to be featured in *Relatively Speaking* as an extension of the Genealogy for Youth Project.
- Our 2019 AGS Conference "Images Through Time" was held in Edmonton April 26-28, 2019 with 258 attending.
- We held four board meetings: one face-to-face, and three a combination of face-to-face and virtual. We held 8 Executive/committee meetings using videoconferencing and one face-to-face.
- The Annual September Retreat combined the directors' meeting with a workshop on strategic planning offered by the Alberta Culture & Tourism Community Development.
- A new membership form was created and the New Member kit was updated.
- Seventeen Special Interest Groups (SIGs) in Camrose (2), Edmonton (11), Lethbridge (1) and Medicine Hat (3) continue to meet regularly and provide valuable research and discussion groups for attendees.
- Branches of the Society continued to provide diverse programming, learning opportunities and projects.
 - Medicine Hat & District Branch has been digitizing 100 years of TELUS/AGT phone books
 - o Edmonton Branch launched the Alberta Name Index (ANI), a simple unified search of Alberta residents named in various sources. At the time of launch it had 487,106 records.
 - o Lethbridge Branch collaborated with Noble Central School on a 3-day genealogy project. Several branch members travelled each day to assist junior and senior high school students with their research.
- AGS held two collaborative TREASURE HUNT sessions in the AGS Library: one in English/French with the Société généalogique du Nord-Ouest and another for the St. Albert Public Library Genealogy group. Participants expressed amazement at the number and variety of resources available and several joined the Society.
- The Policies and Procedures/Bylaws committee continued their work, updating policies and bylaws.
- The AGS webpage saw ~30,000 users in ~47,000 sessions.
- AGS secured funding through membership fees, donations, gaming events, research queries, and grants from the Government of Alberta through Historic Resources Management, and City of Edmonton through the Edmonton Heritage Council. Casino revenue has decreased, placing additional demands on the society.
- The Society continued to employ one part-time office coordinator and one part-time bookkeeper.
