#### MESSAGE FROM ALICE HOYLE, CHARTER MEMBER, PRESIDENT, 2006 – 2008 & 2018 – 2026

In 2000 Marilyn Valkenburg and Denise Franklin had been talking amongst themselves about researching their family history. They spoke to several people (I was one of them) and decided that there was support in the community to establish a genealogy society. They contacted the Alberta Genealogical Society's office in Edmonton.

A room at Wetaskiwin Public Library was booked; Ian Holmes, President of the Alberta Genealogical Society (AGS) at that time, came to Wetaskiwin to tell us about what was required to form a branch. Following the meeting, 16 people signed up and paid the required fees.

On October 4, 2000, a letter was sent to Mr. Holmes advising that the 16 wanted to form a branch of AGS. We had filled four executive positions and were set to go. That was the start of Wetaskiwin branch, and we haven't looked back.

We have been dedicated to providing information, training, guidance and research opportunities for our branch members or anyone who contacts us. Our membership has been encouraged to forge ahead with our own research while being available to assist others with their research. We look forward to the future and the interesting challenges ahead.

### MESSAGE FROM SHARON ANEY, CHARTER MEMBER NEWSLETTER EDITOR 2010 – 2026

As I got into gathering information for our 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary newsletter, I became more impressed with the accomplishments of our organization and those of our members. Our individual skills have grown and our branch has enabled and fostered that growth.

A major reason for doing genealogy is to find our ancestors' names and to preserve and share their stories with our community and our families. Each article we write is a chapter in our family history.

Genealogists are historians. We research to find our family's origins in other times and other countries. Contrary to public opinion, much of the information we need to find is not found online. 


#### "CANADA 150" - 2017

In recognition of Canada's 150th anniversary of Confederation members of the Wetaskiwin Branch of Alberta Genealogical Society have recorded memories of our school days, and of Christmas celebrations in the homes of our childhoods.





These events occurred by and large in the 1950s and early 1960s, and so provide a glimpse of our experiences some 60 years ago.



#### **COVID - 19 PANDEMIC - 2020-2021**

Members of our genealogy society
had been dealing with the "Covid
19 Pandemic" for over fifteen
months. We felt that it was
important to record the emotional
and mental reactions, and societal
changes that we had endured.
We hope that these insights will be
of interest and value to future
generations.

#### AGS PROJECTS

2006 GENFAIR Wetaskiwin branch hosted AGS members from across the province! The event began with a mixer / registration on Friday evening at the Heritage Museum. Norquest College was the venue for Saturday's conference. Four classrooms, a computer lab and well qualified speakers enabled us to cover almost all aspects of genealogy. 72 people enjoyed a banquet where Sylvia Larson gave an address on Hutterite history and lifestyle.

2010 - CEMETERY RECORDING Mavis and Neil Nelson transcribed information from almost 500 grave markers in the New Sweden, Nashville and Lone Ridge cemeteries. Don Brosius transcribed those names and dates onto an AGS template and sent it to Edmonton to be entered into the computer program. Don also photographed the grave markers.

#### GENEALOGY FOR YOUTH

**2017 -** Chaired by Patty Caputo, several young people researched how their ancestors came to Canada. They prepared display boards which they shared, along with some Christmas traditions at branch meetings.

**2019 -** John Althouse, a member of our branch for many years, developed a guide for Unit 2 of AGS's Genealogy for Youth project: "In Search of Your Immigrant Ancestor", which included a case study based upon the research by Mavis Nelson re: Agnes Desideria Anderson. (May 2014 Roots & Branches).

In the **April, 2019** issue of "Roots and Branches" John wrote about how he worked with Mavis to shape the plan that students could use in researching the immigration of their ancestors.

**2020** - Patty Caputo created a Genealogy Escape Room activity. She presented it to twelve young people at the public library and later to branch members.

2020 GENFAIR The venue was rented for April 25, the speakers and caterer were lined up, and we were ready to welcome Alberta's genealogists to celebrate our 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary. But because of the Covid pandemic shutdown it was cancelled only days ahead of the date.

2021 VIRTUAL GENFAIR Our committee was able to reschedule the speakers who had been lined up for the 2020 GenFair, and to arrange that they could make their presentations via Zoom.

This was the first time an AGS GenFair and / or Annual General Meeting was held in a virtual format and it was deemed very successful. A record number of AGS members were in attendance for the AGM.

#### COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

#### LDS FAMILY RESEARCH CENTER / FAMILY SEARCH CENTRE

When our branch was formed in 2000, the major source of genealogical information was the Family History Library in Salt Lake City, Utah. At that time, accessing its resources required traveling to Edmonton. Recognizing the need for a more accessible local resource, the Wetaskiwin Genealogical Society encouraged our LDS members to approach their church leaders in Wetaskiwin. Their efforts bore fruit in the spring of 2004 when a Family History Center was established within their church building, with Claudia Malloch appointed as Director.

The official Grand Opening of the Family History Center took place in October 2004. This local center made it significantly easier to borrow microfilms and conduct research without the need for long-distance travel. Our members emerged as some of the early major volunteers, dedicating their time and expertise to assist the public in their genealogical pursuits. This volunteerism continued until the center was temporarily closed during the COVID-19 epidemic.

Since January 2023 the website "FamilySearch.org" is the primary tool used to aid patrons in their family history endeavors. Additionally, several other genealogical websites are available free of charge via the "FamilySearch Portal", further enhancing the resources available to the community.

#### **VOLUNEER RESEARCH**

Alice Hoyle has answered requests for genealogical research from outside our branch since our beginning, later joined by Lee Koop. Some requests have taken many hours, and all have been answered free of charge.

Their efforts are greatly appreciated and they often receive letters of thanks, but occasionally something special results:

Alice was contacted by people from Scotland who were on vacation and she was able to show them the ancestral lands near Gwynne.

Lee was invited by a family to the unveiling of a memorial to their grandmother, which they were able to place because of his research. Both researchers write of their "projects" for our newsletter. Lee, in particular, occasionally researches beyond the original request, and has had two of his reports awarded the Kenneth Young Award by AGS.

Arising from this, noting the value of obituaries, Lee Koop has undertaken to compile an extensive **collection of obituaries** from local archives, funeral homes, newspapers and funeral card collections.

#### CITY OF WETASKIWIN ARCHIVES

In February 2018 a "For Sale" sign was erected at the City of Wetaskiwin Civic Building, location of the City of Wetaskiwin Archives. This caused great concern to members of our Branch.

On June 25, 2018 twelve Wetaskiwin Branch members, attended the City of Wetaskiwin's council meeting. Alice Hoyle and Sharon Aney expressed concerns about the future of the City Archives, and stressed the importance of keeping this facility open to the public.

City of Wetaskiwin Archives was officially closed on November 27, 2020. From December 10, 2020 to December 22, 2021 four branch members participated in nine ZOOM meetings with other concerned citizen groups and the City's General Manager of Community and Protective Services to determine the viability of the Archives.

On June 13, 2022 eight branch members attended the City council meeting and made representations that the Archives should be preserved and re-opened. Several branch members wrote letters or emails to City councilors.

The Civic Building was sold in November 2022. Some space was leased back to the City for the Archives. On December 12, 2022 the City approved a memorandum of understanding with the Wetaskiwin and District Heritage Museum for the management of the City of Wetaskiwin Archives. In the spring of 2024 Museum staff began taking inventory of the Archives. Several Branch members have been volunteering their time to assist.

#### COLLECTBLES MARKET

Since our branch had been advocating for the preservation of the City Archives for several years, we felt that we should also provide some financial support to the Heritage Museum. In April 2024 we arranged a sale at the Museum of "collectibles", which were donated by our members. It realized over \$900.00.

#### SPEAKING TO INTERESTED GROUPS

☐ Alice Hoyle and Claudia Malloch have spoken about genealogy and family history to several groups at area libraries and seniors residences. ☐ Bob Maynard responded to interested people in Leduc and has mentored an informal genealogy group there for several years.
