Welcome to the Camrose AGS Spring Newsletter!

After a two-month 'rest,' the group has resumed regular meetings, starting with our annual general meeting in March. Elections were conducted, and all incumbents were returned to their positions. Our meeting theme was Researching in Ireland.

2025 is the 25th Anniversary of our branch's formation, and we have some exciting events to celebrate. In addition to our regular summer events, we will hold a workshop in April and October and a celebratory dinner in September—more details to follow.

In 1999, 59 people interested in genealogy research decided that joining the Alberta Genealogical Society would be beneficial. In January 2000, the Camrose group was admitted to the AGS with 18 members. The new group negotiated an arrangement with the Camrose Public Library to use their meeting room at no charge in exchange for hosting two workshops per year.

We have evolved over the last 25 years. The pandemic caused us to move to using Zoom for meetings, and now we host hybrid meetings and workshops. Meetings have moved to the Camrose County Agricultural Services buildings due to changing operating hours at the library. Three Special Interest Groups have been created - Writing Your Family History, Researching Military

Ancestors and a group helping members with questions called Members Helping Members.

AGS Camrose has been a part of numerous community events. Community Registration Night, Founders Days events from 2004 to 2018, and Flagstaff Gathering of the Clans. A major project undertaken was the indexing of the Camrose Canadian Births, Marriages and Deaths. Three volumes have been printed to date up to 1945.

It has been a busy 25 years for the club and hopefully another 25 more.


We picked a date to meet in Edmonton, and knowing my dietary restrictions, he and his wife, Kathy, nicely offered to host me at his daughter's place for brunch.

Family Research and Gardening by Janine Carroll

People who know me well know that I love two activities - family research and gardening. I inherited my passion and love for gardening from gardeners in my family tree, and there are quite a few!

My great-grandparents, David Montgomery Barker (1876-1955) and Annie Alberni Clarke (1880-1960), are in one of the pictures featuring their prize potato patch. The couple moved from Victoria, BC to a farm near Stony Plain in 1911 with their three children: Leslie, Gladys, and Muriel. A few years later, they welcomed another daughter, Elsie.

The Barker family transformed a wilderness area into a thriving garden and operated a market garden, serving the folks with cottages at nearby Edmonton Beach. The photograph was taken in the mid-1910s.

As I gaze longingly out my window, waiting for planting season, I can't help but imagine my great-grandmother doing the same thing over 100 years ago.

David and Annie's daughter, Gladys, my grandmother, later married John Morris and moved to his farm in the Rabbit Hill region (now part of Edmonton), where she created another large garden. A lifelong gardener, she won numerous prizes for vegetables, canning, and baking at community fairs.

As a little girl, I fondly remember listening to conversations between my grandmother and mother about propagation, growing, and harvesting, and working beside them, planting and weeding. I credit both for passing on their knowledge, passion and green thumbs to me.

In the photo titled "The Barker Garden," my grandma is second from the left. Beside her are her sisters, Elsie and Muriel, picking raspberries. This photo dates to the early 1920s.





The LEEDS Method

Organizing DNA Matches by Ancestor by Leanne Broughton (taken by permission from Cariboo Notes Spring 2025, Quesnel Branch of the BCGS)

The Leeds Method is a useful tool for those using AncestryDNA, 23andMe, or other DNA testing services, as it helps to identify grandparent lines and other shared family connections. While basic spreadsheet skills are helpful, the method can also be done with pen and paper.

Step-by-Step Guide to the Leeds Method (this example uses AncestryDNA)

1. Filter DNA Matches

- Open your DNA match list and filter by centimorgan (cM) range.
- Select matches between 90 cM and 400 cM, as these typically include second cousins or closer. This removes distant matches and keeps the focus on relevant family connections.

2. Set Up Your Spreadsheet

- Create a spreadsheet in Excel, Google Sheets, or another program.
- Column A: List all filtered DNA matches.
- Additional columns will represent different family clusters.

3. Assign Colors to Create Clusters

- Start with the first DNA match and assign them a color in Column B.
- This person is your first reference match.
- Compare other matches against this person—if they also share DNA, assign them the same color.

4. Continue Grouping DNA Matches


- Move to the next unmatched person and assign a new color in Column C.
- Compare this new reference person to the remaining matches.
- Continue assigning colors for each distinct genetic cluster.

5. Interpret Results

- Ideally, your matches will fall into four main clusters, representing each of your grandparents' family lines.
- If your matches have family trees, you can check if common ancestors appear.
- In cases of endogamy (family intermarriage), some clusters may overlap or appear more complex.

6. Refine and Analyze

- Use the clusters to trace common ancestors, surnames, and geographical origins.
- Reach out to matches to confirm relationships and gather more family history.
- Reorder your spreadsheet so all members of the same cluster appear together.



This speadsheet is just one example of how one's speadsheet, might look. Column A being the list of surnames. (not shown here)

Matches neatly clustered into four groups, corresponding to each grandparent's lineage.

Matches can be reordered so that they are all grouped together in the spreadsheet. (as shown here)

The Leeds Method is simple yet powerful tool for anyone working with DNA matches. Whether you are a beginner or an experienced genealogist, this method can help bring clarity to your family tree and uncover hidden connections.
