Whenever possible the presentation or the handouts are shared with the participants who attend the Zoom meetings and in-person workshops. The Zoom sessions are recorded with permission from the guest speaker, in advance. At some point, we will be putting the recorded sessions on a new UGG Edmonton website or YouTube channel.

Recovering Relations: Ukrainian Settlers and Indigenous Communities, Dec. 11, 7 pm to 9 pm, MST, with Pamela Trischuk. Zoom only. This session explores the complex and often overlooked relationships between Ukrainian settlers and Indigenous Peoples in east central Alberta. We trace the colonial policies that shaped settlement, examine how Ukrainians both benefited from and contributed to these systems, and uncover stories through "breadcrumbs" in local histories, family narratives, and community teachings.

Participants will gain insight into why these early interactions were limited but meaningful, how attitudes shifted over time, and why neither Ukrainian nor Indigenous experiences were monolithic. Join us as we reflect on how to tell these stories today - acknowledging complexity, avoiding romanticized myths, and committing to the ongoing work of recovering good relations.

Pamela Trischuk has been part of the Ukrainian Cultural Heritage Village team for over 20 years, where she currently serves as Head of Education and Interpretation. With a personal connection to her Ukrainian roots and a deep appreciation for what the stories of the past can teach us, Pamela has led the development of award-winning programs and exhibits that explore the complex histories of Ukrainian settlement in Alberta. In recent years, her work has focused on ensuring that the stories and programs of the UCHV remain relevant and accessible to diverse audiences in an evolving societal landscape. She has also been exploring the nuanced relationships between Ukrainian settlers and Indigenous communities and integrating those stories into the UCHV's interpretive content - an area she continues to research and reflect on with care. Pamela brings both professional insight and personal curiosity to her presentations and is always eager to learn alongside others.


Dec. 21, Winter Solstice, marks the shortest day and longest night of the year.


